## 2017-18 California State Budget

Governor proposes a cautious budget; no additional funding toward LCFF implementation

- LCFF
- No funding toward implementation
- Cost of Living Adjustment of 1.48\% over the 2016-17 targets
- Increase on average of $\$ 120$ per ADA (will vary based on school specific targets)
- Also applies to other state programs
- June Deferral: One third of June LCFF payment deferred to July
- One Time Funds
- Approx. \$48 per ADA (down from \$214 per ADA in 16-17)
- School Facilities
- Up to $\$ 500 \mathrm{M}$ available after accountability provisions on bond funds are enacted
$\square \quad$ Just the first step in iterative process involving Governor and Legislature that will result in final budget being approved in June
- EdTec will continue to monitor developments and provide updates


## 2016-17 Financial Summary

Forecasted Operating Income is \$1.03M, \$0.7M higher than Approved Budget, but \$0.14M less than Previous Forecast


## ADA Update

P-1 ADA came in at 427.9, 7.2 ADA less than Previous Forecast, reducing P-2 Forecast to 432.7

P-1 ADA was due to lower Enrollment \& Attendance Rate than Projected

## Response to Intervention (RTI)

Response to Intervention (RTI) Framework is a system that provides high quality instruction and intervention matched to student need. Student progress is monitored frequently to make decisions about change in instruction or learning goals. Student response data is used to make important educational decisions including eligibility for special education. Students performing below grade level receive targeted intervention with a credentialed teacher for 30 minutes during the instructional day.

## Extended Learning After School Tutoring

In order to improve the performance of underperforming students, REACH teachers provide after school tutoring twice per week to students who continue to achieve below grade level in Math \& Language Arts. Teachers monitor student progress through a continuous improvement process and work in small groups after school to close the acheivement gap for students who do not respond to intervention during the regular school day.
